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
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1 INTRODUCTION

This plan has been prepared to guide the Villages of Sauk City and Prairie du Sac in acquiring and developing public outdoor parks and recreation facilities. It also serves as a tool to participation in outdoor recreation grant programs through the Department of Natural Resources and to suggest regional connections such as through trails to major public open spaces in the area. This plan is intended as a companion to the Sauk Prairie Comprehensive Plan and was prepared in concert with a similar effort for the Sauk Prairie School District.

1.1 Executive Summary

This Comprehensive Outdoor Recreation Plan (CORP) sets forth Sauk Prairie's vision for the future growth and development of its outdoor recreation parks and facilities. The plan is intended to guide the area's outdoor recreation facility development through the year 2020.

Sauk Prairie has enjoyed steady population growth in the past and is anticipated to add an additional 1,145 residents over the next ten years (Wisconsin DOA). These new populations will enjoy a variety of active and passive use parks with amenities such as athletic fields, playgrounds, park shelters and open space.

The existing park system in the Villages of Sauk City and Prairie du Sac is comprised of 17 active and passive use park areas. A majority of these parks are neighborhood scale parks with traditional recreational facilities such as playgrounds and open air shelters. The Villages benefit from their location on the Wisconsin River, a location that serves not only as a dramatic landscape for residents to enjoy but also provides natural habitat for wildlife to exist in view of the community. There are also four local school parks within the Villages owned by the Sauk Prairie School District that can be utilized by local residents for active outdoor recreation (tennis, basketball, play structures, etc.).

During the public input process, several issues repeatedly surfaced from different stakeholder groups, as highlighted below:

- River-based Recreation: A variety of stakeholders expressed a desire for improvements that would enhance the quality of and access to the Wisconsin River for recreation.
- Support Facilities: Need for basic facilities such as restrooms, signage and wayfinding, and equipment storage were noted as an issue for most parks.
- Connections: Stakeholders agreed that the community has a great parks system, but linking the parks with trails and dedicated ped/bike routes is needed.

General recommendations for the entire park system include retrofitting all parks and park facilities to be disabled accessible, including shelters and restrooms; improving existing playlots and playgrounds as neighborhood gathering places for all ages; continuing to develop a community-wide, barrier-free, multi-purpose trail system that connects park sites, existing regional trails, and provides access to natural and cultural resources in the community and region; and, actively pursuing funds for park and recreation programs and park development.

1.1.1 Statement of Need

The purpose of this project is to develop a Comprehensive Park, Recreation and Open Space Plan (CORP) for the Sauk Prairie Recreation Commission (SPRC) and joint municipalities, assess the vitality and needs of the current park and open space system, and provide direction for maintenance, growth and programming for the next five years.

As a working tool, a CORP provides officials with a clear understanding of park land inventory and future recreational facility and open space needs. A CORP also creates an orderly and prioritized strategy for making incremental improvements. The plan will allow the SPRC and participating municipalities to request DNR and other public funding for implementing proposed park improvements.

1.1.2 Mission Statement

The Sauk Prairie Recreation Department strives to serve all people by enhancing their well being through personal empowerment, embracement of diversity, and by delivering quality recreational programming that promotes personal growth and cooperation amongst people of all ages.

1.2 Goals and Objectives

The following section identifies goals and objectives to guide the future development or expansion of parks and recreational facilities in the Sauk Prairie area.

Goal 1.2.1: Establish and maintain high quality parks and recreational services.

Objectives:

- a. Ensure the amount of parks and recreational facilities is reflective of community population needs.
- b. Upgrade and improve existing parks and facilities.
 - i. Develop bi-annual inspections and inventory of existing parks facilities to maintain an active log of facilities improvements.
 - ii. Continue funding the replacement of old and deteriorating equipment in all village parks to ensure health, safety and welfare of visitors including playground equipment and safety surfacing.
- c. Pursue funding for park and recreation development and land acquisition.
- d. Pursue the development of revenue generating recreational facilities and activities, which can aid in the development of new facilities and/or the maintenance of existing facilities.
- e. Investigate private funding sources and partnerships with other groups with overlapping interests, such as the Sauk Prairie School District and Sauk Prairie Healthcare.

Goal 1.2.2: Offer recreational services in an efficient, effective and economical manner.Objectives:

- a. Cooperatively work with surrounding municipalities, the school district and other partners.
- b. Conduct periodic reviews of programs and services and their benefit to the community.
- c. Research alternative organizational structure and potential for a Parks and Recreation system that shares ownership and management of public parks.

Goal 1.2.3: Coordinate development efforts and the use and maintenance of outdoor and indoor recreational facilities among the Sauk Prairie School District, municipalities, the Recreation Department and appropriate sporting associations.Objectives:

- a. Encourage cooperative public/private/municipal/school/sports association development projects to help improve and expand outdoor and indoor recreational opportunities throughout the community in a cost-effective manner.
- b. Develop formal use/revenue/maintenance agreements between the villages, school district and community/volunteer organizations to help fund, operate and maintain public outdoor and indoor recreation facilities in the district.
- c. Explore a greater role for the Sauk Prairie Recreation Commission in ownership and/or maintenance of public park space in the Sauk Prairie area, in cooperation with the Village's and potential expansion of the Commission's charge.

Goal 1.2.4: Acquire and develop a new community park/athletic complex to meet current and future recreational needs within the Sauk Prairie area.Objectives:

- a. Evaluate the specific facility needs of the community via citizens and focus groups of athletic organizations in the community.
- b. Evaluate location, program and cost feasibility.
- c. Coordinate planning and development efforts with the school district and other community partners.

Goal 1.2.5: Evaluate and analyze park, open space and recreational services based on the needs of the community.Objectives:

- a. Encourage citizen involvement with the development of the plan.
- b. Survey community to determine changing needs.

Goal 1.2.6: Promote bicycle and pedestrian facilities throughout Sauk Prairie.Objectives:

- a. Complete the Great Sauk Trail.
- b. Develop a comprehensive network of off-street trails, including western and southern legs to build a loop being established through the Great Sauk Trail and Highway PF trail legs.
- c. Improve local trail connectivity throughout the Sauk Prairie area to parks, conservancy areas, schools, local businesses and all regional trails.

- d. Establish wayfinding signage to allow new residents or visitors to effectively travel throughout Sauk Prairie on foot or bicycle or other means (skateboard, rollerblades, etc.)
- e. Increase the availability and accessibility of bicycle parking.

Goal 1.2.7: Promote water recreation throughout the community.

Objectives:

- a. Enhance and maintain access to the river through development of portals.
- b. Improve visibility and awareness of the natural amenity and asset the river provides to the community.
- c. Promote and maintain boat launches.
- d. Continue to support community events, and business and housing development that supports river activity.
- e. Collaborate with the Ferry Bluff Eagle Council and others to preserve Bald Eagle habitat and celebrate the eagles.

Goal 1.2.8: Ensure that the community's existing open space, recreational facilities and programs are designed to meet the special needs of all residents regardless of age, gender, or ability.

Objectives:

- a. Prepare a site Master Plan prior to improvement and/or development of any public park to assure the highest and best use of existing resources.
- b. Provide for barrier-free access in all new park facility construction and play areas.
- c. Achieve compliance with accessibility requirements in existing facilities by 2025.
- d. Encourage participation and accommodation of all interested participants at park and recreational meetings and in recreational programs.
- e. Comply with the Americans with Disabilities Act as it applies to communication with the public. This is in reference to the standard language that government agencies should use on their agendas and other public meeting documents stating accommodation of those with disabilities who wish to attend the meeting.

Goal 1.2.9: Coordinate subdivision review with all departments responsible for providing or maintaining adequate park facilities.

Objectives:

- a. Consult and incorporate the needs identified in the Comprehensive Outdoor Recreation Plan before subdivision plats are approved.
- b. Evaluate land dedicated for parks to differentiate between land appropriate for active park use, land appropriate for open space only, and land requiring protection from development. Land requiring protection from development should be protected via development codes.
- c. Continually evaluate and update local zoning and subdivision ordinances so that they adequately address the recreational needs of residents.
- d. Preserve any proposed trail corridors in any review of new development.

Goal 1.2.10: Provide residents with safe and reliable recreation equipment throughout the community park system.

Objectives:

- a. Accurately inventory existing parks facilities and maintain an active log of facilities improvement.
- b. Continue funding the replacement of old and deteriorating recreation equipment in all area parks.
- c. Continually monitor and maintain existing park equipment to ensure its longevity and safety.

Goal 1.2.11: Stress the benefits of larger neighborhood and community parks that provide a wide range of facilities over small playground and tot-lot facilities.

Objectives:

- a. Analyze the location, size and function of existing and proposed parks as annexations, residential development, or land use changes occur.
- b. Communicate the importance of dynamic, multi-purpose parks and recreational facilities as a component of Sauk Prairie's regional draw and economic development potential.
- c. Use Park Service Area Criteria to help determine the location of future park sites (see Chapter 2).

Goal 1.2.12: Recognize the importance of an adequate park budget, which can financially address existing park hazards and allow for future parkland acquisition and facility development.

Objectives:

- a. Use the Comprehensive Outdoor Recreation Plan as a guide to establish yearly park budgets and funding for the Sauk Prairie Recreation Commission.
- b. Invest funds for the development of facilities that will maximize existing park and recreation areas and provide exciting recreational programs, with the intention of increasing park prominence, community visibility, and use.

Goal 1.2.13: Use all available resources to further enhance the quality of the Village's park system.

Objectives:

- a. Continually pursue state and federal funding programs, which can aid in the purchase and/or development of desired park system improvements.
- b. Nurture the existing positive relationships with public and private organizations for donations and volunteer help to aid in park system development.
- c. Update the Sauk Prairie Comprehensive Outdoor Recreation Plan every five years to maintain grant eligibility.
- d. Pursue the development of revenue generating recreational facilities and activities, which can aid in the development of new facilities and/or the maintenance of existing facilities.

Goal 1.2.14: Coordinate development efforts and the use and maintenance of recreational facilities among the municipalities, the School District, and appropriate recreation associations.

Objectives:

- a. Coordinate planning efforts of new transportation corridors to ensure proper consideration of trail connection development, on-street bicycle facilities and adequate green space protection.
- b. Coordinate the public use of indoor and outdoor school recreation facilities, including collaboration with Sauk Prairie Healthcare on use of its Wellness Center.
- c. Encourage cooperative Village/School/Youth sports organization development projects to help improve and expand recreational opportunities throughout the community in a cost-effective manner.
- d. Participate in regional planning of parks and recreational needs, including with the Sauk and Dane County Parks Departments, and the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources.


1.3 Review of Past Planning Documents (Local, Regional, State)

1.3.1 Sauk Prairie Comprehensive Plan (2013)

The *Sauk Prairie Comprehensive Plan* was adopted in 2005 and amended in 2013. The plan provides a blueprint for future growth and change in the Sauk Prairie area over a 20 year period. At the time of writing, the Sauk Prairie communities were in the process of completing a 10-year update to this plan. Communities directly participating in the planning process include the Village of Sauk City, Village of Prairie du Sac and Town of Prairie du Sac.

The key recommendations of the plan include:

- Suggests a future growth pattern which would keep Village expansion within the area of Highway 12 and a future Sauk City bypass route over the subsequent 20 years.
- Identifies significant areas for residential development to the west of both Villages, in a traditional neighborhood form reminiscent of past neighborhoods, and including integrated parks and open spaces.
- Identifies an interest in a community park/athletic complex serving the entire area, and suggested several alternative sites and the pros and cons of each. See the adjacent map for proposed locations.
- Identifies the general locations of new neighborhood parks to serve future residential development areas.
- Conceptualizes and maps a generalize bicycle route network.
- Suggests the Wisconsin River as a focus for recreation, activity, business, and housing development.



1.3.2 Sauk County Comprehensive Outdoor Recreation Plan (2014 - 2019)

The Sauk County Comprehensive Outdoor Recreation Plan identifies the strengths and needs of Sauk County's parks, facilities and outdoor recreation opportunities. The CORP maintains eligibility for grants and aid money for County park projects and serves as a foundation for the acquisition and development of parks and recreational facilities.

The plan identified three main goals:

- Preserve and enhance recreational lands and facilities and continue to expand outdoor recreational resources available for citizens and visitors as both populations continue to grow.
- Promote and improve management of natural resources by encouraging stewardship of public park facilities, forests and open spaces as well as private lands, to enhance outdoor recreational opportunities.
- Enhance coordination of outdoor recreation activities and the development of new facilities while effectively promoting the opportunities that exist throughout Sauk County.

1.3.3 Great Sauk Trail – A Cooperative Plan to Build a World-Class Recreation Trail (2015)

This plan was created to provide a framework for the route, users, amenities and basic construction guidelines for the proposed Great Sauk Trail. The trail would run approximately eight miles from Sauk City to Devil's Lake State Park through abandoned railroad right-of-way. The Great Sauk Trail would be a key connection in linking the trail network from Middleton to the 400 Trail in Reedsburg.

The plan includes implementation recommendations in the following categories:

- Environmental Considerations
- Trail-Roadway Crossings
- Recommended Strategies
- Selection Criteria
- Project Priorities and Phasing
- Estimated Cost
- Funding Sources

1.3.4 Safe Routes to School Plan (2011)

Working with the Sauk Prairie School District, the Village of Sauk City completed a Safe Routes to School Plan in 2011. The plan identified ways to improve bike and pedestrian access to Sauk Prairie Middle School. Some recommendations included:

- Installing a 10' wide multi-use path on Sycamore Street
- Installing sidewalks or a path on Hemlock Street
- Installing signage to restrict traffic flow
- Installing crosswalks and pedestrian beacons

1.3.5 Wisconsin's State Outdoor Recreation Plan

Since 1965, the State has developed and maintained the Statewide Comprehensive Outdoor Recreation Plan (SCORP) in an attempt to classify, measure, and ultimately provide for the preferences and needs of a statewide recreating public. Goals include the following:

1. Improve integration of outdoor recreation interests and needs in land use and other relevant planning efforts.
2. Continue to provide and enhance access to Wisconsin recreational land and waters.
3. Promote outdoor recreation as a means of improving public health among Wisconsinites.
4. Establish great urban parks and community green spaces.

1.4 Summary of the Planning Process

1.4.1 Work Plan and Timeline

This plan was developed between March 2015 and September 2015. The process included meetings with staff and other officials, a public information meeting, and a presentation to the Intergovernmental Planning Committee (IPC). All parks were audited by Ayres staff with findings identified on inventory sheets. An online survey was also performed to elicit public information from individuals and groups unable to attend the public meetings.

1.4.2 Meetings

Meeting #1 March 27, 2015: the kick-off meeting was at the Community Center with representatives from the Village of Sauk City, the Village of Prairie du Sac, the Sauk Prairie Recreation Department and the consulting planner. The scope and timeline of the project were reviewed and dates for the remainder of the meetings were set. Key discussion points included activities and programming, priority improvements and site specific issues.

Meeting #2 June 2, 2015: A public informational meeting was held to gather input on draft recommendations and preliminary mapping.

Meeting #3 June 18, 2015 A progress review meeting with the Village staff was held to review input received to date and present preliminary plan recommendations.

Meeting #4 September 3, 2015 Ayres attended the Park Commission meeting to present the final draft plan.

1.4.3 Online Survey


During the development of this plan, an online survey was created to record public opinion concerning key issues and opportunities for enhanced use and enjoyment of Sauk Prairie's parks and open spaces. The survey was also used to formulate recommendations in Chapter 3. A web link to the survey was placed on the website of the Sauk Prairie Recreation Department and distributed via e-mail. The survey was activated on March 31, 2015 and closed May 12. A total of 589 individuals responded to the survey, 85.2% of whom were residents of the Village of Prairie du Sac, the Village of Sauk City, the Town of Prairie du Sac, the Town of Sumpter, the Town of Mazomanie or the Town of Roxbury. A summary of responses for the entire survey is available for review in Appendix A. General findings are summarized below.

When asked about the overall condition of each type of recreation facility, the most frequently rated condition was "good". Items like park shelters, picnic areas and playground equipment were rated "good" by a majority of respondents. Facilities that the most people believed "need improvement" include park restrooms, natural gardens, park concession facilities, and soccer fields.

When asked if there were enough of certain types of facilities, the most frequently desired amenities were outdoor ice skating rinks (58.3%), hiking trails (51.4%), park restroom facilities (51.3%), a splash pad (50.7%) and shared-use trails (48.9%). The desire for these types of facilities was reflected in multiple open-ended responses throughout the survey. Other needed facilities included athletic fields, gardens, a bandshell/performance stage, cross country ski trails, dog exercise facilities, basketball courts and a skate park. 77.0% of respondents would be willing to pay more in taxes or user fees for park facilities and amenities that are not currently provided in the area.

When asked whether the park system serves the needs of all age groups, respondents felt that the most underserved group was "adolescents 13-18 years." See **Chart 1** for survey results. This sentiment was reflected in multiple comments suggesting that teens and pre-teens need more opportunities for free outdoor activities. Some suggestions for serving this age group included athletic fields, a skate park, increased programming, an outdoor ice rink and a disc golf course.

Chart 1- Survey results on whether the current park system serves the needs of all age groups.




Support components are accessory structures and facilities necessary for park use. These include restrooms, parking lots, handicap accessibility, shelters, and public transportation. When asked if any of these facilities were inadequate in Sauk Prairie, “Safe Routes to Walk and/or Bike to Facility” and “Public Restrooms” received the highest percentage of affirmative responses with 62.7% and 61.2% respectively. See **Chart 2** for survey results.

Survey respondents frequently brought up issues with support components such as:


- Limited availability of, and access to, park restrooms
- Unsafe pedestrian crossings at Water Street
- Limited parking at parks with athletic fields such as Westwynde
- Poor ADA access to certain park facilities such as play equipment and restrooms
- Insufficient programming for teens

Respondents were also asked to consider the needs of the community for additional outdoor recreation facilities, resources, and programs, and to rate the available selections from 1-5 in order of importance. **Chart 3** shows the improvement options that received the highest priority of importance as revealed through the survey. The most commonly ranked #1 priority was Development of New Facilities (34%), followed by Maintenance of Existing Facilities (30%) and Improvements Added to Existing Facilities (20%).

The charts on the following pages summarize the results of survey questions focusing on specific recreational facilities and equipment. **Chart 4** show the results of a question on the condition of park facilities while **Chart 5** shows the results of a question as to whether Sauk Prairie parks offer enough specific facilities and equipment to meet demand.

Chart 4 – Survey results of the overall condition of each type of recreational facility.





Chart 5 – Survey results as to whether or not the community has sufficient quantities for each type of facility to meet the demand.



1.5 Sauk Prairie Demographics

1.5.1 Social Characteristics

This section presents social factors that are important to understanding the Sauk Prairie community and its recreation needs and potential. Particularly important to planning for the adequate provision of parks and open spaces are population trends and projections over the planning period (5-10 years) and age characteristics of potential park users.

Population Trends and Projections

There is a direct relationship between population and the need for parks and recreational space. Predicting how the population might grow in the future provides important information about the amount of new parkland and recreational facilities that will be needed to serve the new populations.


According to data provided by the U.S. Bureau of the Census, Sauk Prairie has experienced stable and consistent population growth over the last 45 years. The combined population of the Villages of Sauk City and Prairie du Sac grew by 13% between 1970 and 1980, 15% between 1980 and 1990, 15% between 1990 and 2000, and 16% between 2000 and 2010. There was an overall population growth of 79% from 1970 to 2015. The Wisconsin Department of Administration (DOA) projects that Sauk City will experience a 21% population growth between the years 2010 and 2035 while Prairie du Sac will increase its population by 37%. That amounts to an additional 1,885 residents in the two villages by the year 2035. Population information for Prairie du Sac, Sauk City and comparable communities is provided in Table 1.1.

This increase in population is significant because current NRPA standards require a minimum of 10.5 acres of dedicated parkland per 1000 residents. Utilizing this methodology, a minimum of 42.0 acres of new parkland will be needed to accommodate the additional 1,885 residents in 2035.

Ethnic Background

In 2010, the Census indicated the largest percentage of Sauk Prairie residents (92.7%) were “White”. The second highest percentage was “Hispanic or Latino” with (4.9%) followed by “Two or more races” (1.0%) and “Asian” (0.5%). Other races make up less than 1% of the remaining population.

Employment/Unemployment

The U.S. Census estimates the 2009 – 2013 unemployment rates for the Villages of Sauk City and Prairie du Sac were 7.4% and 7.0% respectively. Those rates are somewhat lower than the statewide unemployment rate during this same time period of 7.8%.

Age

Age distribution in Sauk Prairie is shown in Table 1.2. Age cohorts are an important consideration when determining park facilities because certain age groups are more likely to utilize certain recreation facilities depending upon their stage in life. For example, in 2010 there were an estimated 512 children under the age of 5 (6.9% of Sauk Prairie’s population). These children would be best served by low platforms with ramps or ladders, sand areas, or short slides no taller than 4 feet. These same facilities would be uninteresting to a 10 year old. A well-rounded park system will provide a variety of facilities (soccer fields, etc.) and equipment (swings, etc.) for all potential users regardless of ability or age.

Changes in age distribution between 2000 and 2010 seem to suggest there is a growing need for adult-oriented (55 and older) activity centers. Following national trends, the community is likely to experience an increase in senior residents seeking recreation opportunities. These populations are generally seeking walking paths (with benches) and formalized senior programming as well as fishing and other outdoor options.

1.5.2 Physical Characteristics

This section presents physical factors in the community and region that are important to understanding Sauk Prairie's recreation potential. The following language was extracted from the Conditions and Issues Volume of the pending update to the Sauk Prairie Comprehensive Plan:

Landforms and Topography

Views are dominated by flat to rolling farmland with backdrops of the Driftless Area to the west, the Baraboo Range to the north, and the Wisconsin River bluffs to the east and south. Broad expanses of river, surrounded by riparian woodlands and rocky bluffs, characterize the Wisconsin River Valley. This river corridor contains shifting sand bars, floodplain forests, brackish waters, rocky bluffs, and eagle habitats. The Villages of Prairie du Sac and Sauk City were formed with strong relationships to the River. The Villages have been developed on the glacial outwash plain with generally flat topography and excellent views of the surrounding hills.

Geology

A 1990 Geological and Natural History Survey from the University of Wisconsin-Extension describes the Sauk Prairie Area's geological features as follows:

- **The Johnstown Moraine.** In this area the Johnstown moraine is a hummocky ridge, typically about 300 meters wide. To the north-northeast the moraine crosses the crest of the Baraboo Hills. The moraine shows up as a small bump on the skyline. Where the Johnstown moraine crosses the Baraboo Hills it is a narrow ridge, typically no more than 50 meters wide. The surface of the moraine is typically hummocky and is littered with a variety of rock types, some of which indicate long-distance glacial transport.
- **The Johnstown Outwash Plain:** The broad, flat surface west of the Johnstown moraine in this area is the outwash plain deposited by meltwater streams flowing from the Green

Bay Lobe during the Johnstown Phase of the Wisconsin Glaciation. The meltwater-stream sediment in this area is typically 30 meters or more thick and is predominantly slightly gravelly sand. As this outwash plain expanded westward and its surface elevation increased, it dammed lakes in the eastward-draining streams between the bedrock hills to the west. These lakes have since drained, but thick lake sediment in these tributaries attests to their former existence.

- **The Driftless Area:** The flat-topped hills forming the skyline to the west are part of the Driftless Area. There is no evidence indicating that the Driftless Area has been glaciated. The hills are composed of Cambrian sandstone and Ordovician dolomite. The flat tops of the hills in this area are underlain by Oneota dolomite.
- **The Baraboo Hills:** The skyline to the north is the crest of the Baraboo Hills, which are composed primarily of Proterozoic quartzite. The part of the Baraboo Hills visible from this stop is part of the South Range, the south limb of the Baraboo Syncline.

Metallic and Non-Metallic Resources

Gravel deposits are generally located within the eastern portion of the Area, adjacent to the Wisconsin River. Gravel is identified under both Villages, south of Highway Z, and in scattered locations close to Otter Creek.

Soils

Fertile soils in the Sauk Prairie Area are due to glacial outwash. The Area was covered in prairie, followed by cropland after settlers arrived. In addition to helping assess farmland quality, soil suitability is a key factor in determining the best and most cost-effective locations for new development. Problems that limit development on certain soils include slumping, poor drainage, erosion, steep slopes, and high water tables. Based on the Soil Survey for Sauk County (1980 - USDA Soil Conservation Service), soils in the Sauk Prairie Area are grouped into five major types:

- **Dickenson-Gotham-Dakota:** This is the predominant soil type in the Area, generally located west of the river to Honey Creek and northward along Otter Creek. The potential for residential development is good, but ground water pollution from conventional septic systems can be a hazard due to quick percolation. Slope and excess wetness also cause moderate to severe limitations for conventional septic systems in some places.
- **La Farge-Nordan-Gale:** This soil group is located in two spots along the western Town limit. The potential for residential development is fair, but depth to bedrock is a severe limitation for conventional septic systems in most places.
- **McHenry-St. Charles:** This group is located in the northeast corner of the Sauk Prairie Area, adjacent to the Wisconsin River. The potential for residential development is good, but slope is a moderate to severe limitation for conventional septic systems.
- **Ettrick-Fluvaquents Wet-Curran:** This soil group is located adjacent to Honey Creek, and is, in general, inappropriate for development.
- **Fluvaquents Wet-Fluvaquents Group:** These soils are found along the Wisconsin River, south of the Village of Sauk City. The potential for residential development is poor; flooding and wetness are severe limitations for conventional septic systems.

Groundwater

Groundwater is found at various depths, depending on the general topography, the distance above the permanent stream level, and the character of the underlying rock formation. Most groundwater in Sauk County is obtained from the Cambrian sandstone aquifer. Another important source of groundwater are the sand and gravel deposits along the Wisconsin River. This area is often susceptible to human-induced and some natural pollutants.

The WisDNR Wellhead Protection Program is a preventive program designed to protect public water supply wells. The goal of wellhead protection is to prevent contaminants from entering public water supply wells by managing the land that contributes water to the wells. The two Village zoning ordinances (particularly Prairie du Sac's) have more updated and refined areas and policies for wellhead protection.

Groundwater in the Sauk Prairie Area is generally of good quality and is usable for most purposes. The following are the potential threats to the groundwater supply:

- **Older Private On-Site Wastewater Treatment Systems:** Lands zoned for future development in the Town, mostly near the Wisconsin River, have soils that are identified as "Highly Suitable" for conventional on-site waste treatment systems.
- **Agricultural Practices and Facilities:** Properly designed livestock waste storage facilities reduce the potential for causing groundwater pollution. Site-specific factors are most important in determining the threat of groundwater pollution from animal waste.
- **Closed Landfills:** Many older landfills were located in worked-out sand and gravel pits, or in low-lying wetlands. Solid waste disposal sites, or landfills, are potential sources of groundwater pollution. These landfill sites pose a much greater risk to local groundwater quality than modern landfills because of poor location and absence of liners or advanced leachate collection systems. WisDNR requires a separation of 1,200 feet (slightly less than a quarter mile) between open or closed landfills and new private water supply wells.
- **Badger Army Ammunition Plant:** The Badger Army Ammunition Plant, built in the early 1940's, produced propellant for ammunition during WWII, the Korean War and the Vietnam War. A 7,400 acre site in total, the former plant has been undergoing cleanup and demolition for the past decade in preparation for opening to the public as the Sauk Prairie Recreation Area. Final inspections have been recently completed by the Wisconsin Army National Guard and WisDNR at the former plant. Some evidence of groundwater contaminant plumes beyond the southern plant boundary were found, discharging to the Lower Wisconsin Riverway at Prairie du Sac. An alternative groundwater remedial strategy near the Badger Army Ammunition Plant has been approved, which may include installation of a new public water supply system. Further investigation of contaminants found in the soil associated with the three identified contaminant groundwater plumes will be done. Local municipalities involved in a new sanitary district formation process would include both the Town and the Village of Prairie du Sac. A petition has been made for whether or not to form a sanitary district for the purpose of negotiating a proposed municipal water system with the United States Army. The Wisconsin Public Service Commission will help to determine whether or not the Army's proposal is feasible.

Surface Water

The following are the three primary sources of surface water within the Sauk Prairie Area:

- **Wisconsin River/Lake Wisconsin:** The Wisconsin River is the most significant natural resource in the Sauk Prairie Area. The Wisconsin River separates Sauk County from Dane and Columbia Counties. In 1914, the river was dammed north of the Village of Prairie du Sac, creating the 9,000-acre Lake Wisconsin. Not only does this Area provide significant Bald Eagle habitat, but the Lower Wisconsin River below the Prairie du Sac Dam supports one of the healthiest large-river fish communities in the Midwest. Lands along the River south of the Villages are included in the Lower Wisconsin State Riverway, which was established to protect and preserve the scenic beauty and natural character of the lower Wisconsin River valley. The Lower Wisconsin State Riverway Board administers aesthetic protection guidelines for the Riverway.
- **Honey Creek:** Honey Creek is a Class II trout stream at its headwaters, west of the Town of Prairie du Sac. Within the Sauk Prairie Area, Honey Creek supports a warm water sport fishery, as well as the seasonal migration of game fish from the Wisconsin River during the summer. The stream is influenced by intense agricultural activities. Stream straightening, cattle trampling stream banks and subsequent bank erosion, cultivated fields up to the edge of Honey Creek and its tributaries, and wetland drainage have resulted in sedimentation problems in the stream. The most obvious example of this is the silt and sediment delta forming in the Wisconsin River at the mouth of Honey Creek. Honey Creek is also impacted by issues related to manure handling and discharge, as well as by industrial discharge from the Cedar Grove cheese factory.
- **Otter Creek:** Otter Creek generally runs north and south through the center of the Town of Prairie du Sac. The headwaters of Otter Creek are in a heavily wooded part of the Baraboo Hills, north of the Sauk Prairie Area. Because much of the surrounding land is protected, the upper two to three miles of the creek are pristine. Approximately three miles are Class I trout waters and a native brook trout fishery. Below the trout water, the stream leaves the Driftless Area and flows through the Sauk Prairie Area. The character of the stream changes as does adjacent land use activities. Cropland and bank erosion create some habitat and water quality problems. Portions of the lower reaches of the stream dry up occasionally, and the heavy use of groundwater for agricultural irrigation may be the cause. WisDNR has ranked Otter Creek a “high priority” for reducing non-point source pollution.

Under Wisconsin Statutes, lands within the Town and annexed to the Villages after May 7, 1982 and close to these and other surface waters are subject to shoreland zoning regulation, which generally require a minimum building setbacks and protection of shoreline vegetation. Sauk County and Village zoning ordinances provide additional detail.

Drainage Basins

The Sauk Prairie Area is located in the Lower Wisconsin River Basin. Basins are further divided into watersheds, and the most of the Sauk Prairie Area falls within the Honey Creek Watershed. The very northeast corner of the Town north of Highway Z is located in the Lake Wisconsin Watershed.

Non-point source pollution is the primary water quality issue within the Honey Creek Watershed; overall, the watershed is ranked as a medium priority with respect to non-point

pollution, and the water quality in the watershed is considered poor. The increasing siltation of streams is significant; Honey Creek discharges a large amount of sediment to the Wisconsin River. In addition, some streams in the watershed have been impaired by nearby manure discharge. Two municipalities discharge treated municipal sanitary effluent into the watershed—the Village of Plain discharges to a tributary of Honey Creek and the Sauk Prairie Sewerage Commission discharges into the groundwater.

Wetlands

Wetlands are important for aquifer recharge, flood control, groundwater and surface water quality improvement, and wildlife habitat, especially for nesting sandhill cranes and other birds. WisDNR has identified and mapped wetlands of two or more acres in the Wisconsin Wetlands Inventory. A large wetlands complex is located at the confluence of Honey and Otter Creek and the Wisconsin River. Additional wetlands are adjacent to Honey Creek. There are also areas of hydric soils, likely drained former wetlands, south of River Road. Wetland alteration is subject to State, federal, county, and village regulation, and generally restricted.

Floodplains

The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) designates floodplains; FEMA Flood Insurance Rate Maps are the definitive source of floodplain information. Floodplains in the Sauk Prairie Area are primarily located at the confluence of Honey and Otter Creeks into the Wisconsin River. Additional lands along the Honey and Otter Creeks and along the Wisconsin River are delineated as floodplains.

The State and FEMA require county and Village regulation of development in floodplains. Development is strongly discouraged in floodplains, to avoid both on-site and up- and downstream property damage.

Woodlands

The Sauk Prairie Area has some significant woodland cover. Generally coinciding with areas of steep slopes, this kind of landscape can be difficult to utilize for agriculture or home sites. The most common species found in the woodlands are oak, maple, and basswood.

Steep Slopes

Hilltop and ridgetops are important natural features that serve to define the horizon. These features are generally located along the northern and southwestern portions of the Sauk Prairie Area. Although surrounded by the Baraboo Hills and river bluffs, the three-community Sauk Prairie Area generally lacks dramatic changes in topography, with the exception of Ferry Bluff, which is located in the southwestern corner within the Lower Wisconsin River State Wildlife Area. Steep wooded slopes provide wildlife habitat, enhance scenic beauty, and generally provide a natural barrier to development. In addition, steep slopes separate the two downtowns from the Wisconsin River to the east. Steep slopes are also located in the northwest corner of the Town.

Slopes between 12 and 20 percent grade present challenges for building development. Slopes that exceed a 20 percent grade are generally not recommended as development sites. Disturbing soils and vegetation on steep slopes can result in severe erosion and soil

degradation, which can have an impact on nearby water resources, and cause damage to buildings, roads, and utilities.

2 ANALYSIS OF THE PARKS AND OPEN SPACE SYSTEM

This chapter analyzes the parks and open space system in the Sauk Prairie area. It inventories and classifies the park system based on national standards established by the National Recreation and Park Association. In addition, this chapter documents the nearby county and state outdoor recreation supply available to area residents.

2.1 Village of Sauk City & Village of Prairie du Sac Parks and Open Space Facilities

The information for this section was gathered from site visits conducted by Ayres staff, discussion with staff from the Villages and Recreation Department, and review of past planning documents. A Facility Matrix for the Sauk Prairie park system is located in Appendix B. See Appendix C for a map of park locations.

2.1.1 Mini Parks

Mini parks include specialized facilities that serve a concentrated or limited population or specific group such as tots or senior citizens. Desirable size is 1 acre or less, preferably a minimum of ¼ acre.

Blanchard Park

Blanchard Park is a 0.50 acre mini park in Prairie du Sac located at the intersection of Forest Lane and Woodland Trail. Amenities include a playground with a play structure, spring riders and benches. Vegetation species include pine, honey locust, spruce and lilac.

Fireman's Park

Fireman's Park is a 0.29 acre mini park located at the intersection of Highway 60 and Water Street in Prairie du Sac. The park includes a fire bell monument, benches and a drinking fountain.

Fuchs Park

"Bill" Fuchs Park is a 0.76 acre park located at the corner of Dallas and John Quincy Adams Streets in Sauk City. The park was dedicated in 2007 with a shelter and restrooms added in 2012. Other amenities include a play structure, swings and a parking lot. Vegetation species include spruce and red maple.

Graff Park

This 0.86 acre park in Prairie du Sac is located at 350 Water Street overlooking the Wisconsin River. The park includes benches, a picnic table and a drinking fountain.

Washington Park

This 0.55 acre mini park is located on Galena Street between 4th and 5th Streets in Prairie du Sac. The park is currently open space and is used for snow storage.

2.1.2 Neighborhood Parks

Neighborhood parks are areas for multiple and sometimes intensive recreation activities, such as field games, court games, crafts, playground apparatus, skating, picnicking, splashpads and the like. Desirable size is between 3 to 10 acres.

Elsing Park

This 3.56 acre neighborhood park is located at 908 21st Street in the Village of Prairie du Sac. Park amenities include a sand volleyball court, a shelter, a playground and a basketball court. Vegetation species include maple, oak and linden.

Fieldstone Park

Fieldstone Park is a 1.49 acre neighborhood park at 2020 Fieldstone Boulevard in Prairie du Sac. Amenities include a gazebo, a play structure and swings. Vegetation species include spruce, pine, red maple and red twig dogwood.

Florence Park

This 1.59 acre park is located at 1400 Lincoln Avenue in Prairie du Sac. Amenities include a shelter, playground, sand volleyball and restrooms. Vegetation species include ash, honey locust, crabapple, spruce and red maple.

Junge Park

Junge Park is a 3.06 acre neighborhood park at 1535 Hemlock Street in Sauk City. Amenities include a shelter, playground and sand volleyball court. The large shelter makes this a popular park for family reunions and similar gatherings. Vegetation species include sycamore, ash, maple and crabapple.

Marion Park

This 4.88 acre neighborhood park is adjacent to Grand Avenue Elementary School at 145 1st Street in Prairie du Sac. It contains shelters, a playground and a disc golf course. Vegetation includes ash, pine, honey locust, maple and bur oak.

Westwynde Park

Westwynde Park is a 5.59 acre neighborhood park at 2011 Prairie Street in Prairie du Sac. Amenities include a shelter building, playground and softball field. Vegetation species include red maple, crabapple and assorted plantings in landscaping beds along Prairie Street.

2.1.3 Community Parks

Community parks are areas of diverse environmental quality and may include areas suited for intense recreational facilities, such as athletic complexes and large swimming pools. Desirable size is 10 acres but may vary depending on facilities offered.

August Derleth Park

August Derleth Park is a 26.91 acre Sauk City community park located on the Wisconsin River. The park includes soccer fields, a shelter, natural areas and a system of trails making up part of the Village Riverwalk.

Jaycee Athletic Park

This 8.31 acre park is located at 305 Hemlock Street in Sauk City. The Chuck Hall Memorial Field at the park is home to the Sauk Prairie Twins home talent team and the Sauk Prairie High School baseball team. The park is also a host to tournaments throughout the year. Other park amenities include a basketball court, tennis courts, sand volleyball courts, a shelter and a playground. Vegetation species include spruce, red maple, sugar maple, ash and hackberry.

2.1.4 Special Use Parks

Special use parks are typically areas for specialized or single purpose recreational activities, such as golf courses, nature centers, skate parks, and ball diamonds.

Doll Park

Doll Park is a 4.16 acre park located at 1300 Grand Avenue in Prairie du Sac. It contains a soccer field, general open space and doubles as a large stormwater detention basin. Vegetation species include ash, blue spruce, arbor vitae and crabapple.

Eagle Overlook

This eagle viewing area at 490 Water Street in Prairie du Sac includes a telescope, benches, and interpretive signage. This site will be a portal to the Great Sauk Trail when it is completed.

Meyer Oak Grove Park

This 4.13 acre Sauk City park is located at 780 Phillips Boulevard. Amenities include a prairie flower garden and gazebo. The gazebo was built from 250 year old oak trees destroyed in the park in 1998 by a storm. Current vegetation species include bur oak, pin oak and crabapple.

Veteran's Memorial Park

Veteran's Memorial Park is a 20.55 acre special use park at 700 VFW Drive in Prairie du Sac. The park include campsites, a boat launch, shelters and a playground. Reservations for use of park facilities are handled by the VFW. Recent improvements were made to the park including a new parking lot and boat launch.

2.1.5 School Parks and Recreational Facilities

Although not calculated as components of Village provided parks and open space, school facilities in Sauk Prairie also offer community residents with outdoor recreation activities, for the most part with structured play equipment and playing fields. The School District contains four elementary schools, one middle school and one high school.

Facilities at schools within the Sauk Prairie School District service area include:

- 6 - Baseball/softball diamonds
- 1 - Sandlot backstop
- 8 - Tennis courts
- 7 - Soccer fields
- 3 - Basketball courts
- 6 - 1/2 basketball courts
- 4 - Playgrounds
- 2 – Pools (Indoor & outdoor)
- 1 – Multi-use (Soccer, football, track)

It should be noted that two of the four elementary schools (Merrimac Community Charter Elementary and Tower Rock Elementary) are located outside of the Sauk Prairie Recreation Department service area. See Map 2 – Appendix C for this boundary (As “Project Limits” in legend).

2.1.6 Trail Corridors

A linear park or trail corridor is an area designated for one or more modes of recreational travel such as hiking, biking, snowmobiling, etc.

Existing trail corridors include the Riverwalk which begins at Highway 12 and runs along the river to August Derleth Park. The Riverwalk connects to the Highway 12 Path and potentially to the planned Great Sauk Trail. Upon the completion of the Great Sauk Trail it should be possible to bike from Sauk City to Devils Lake State Park entirely on paved trails. See Map 4 – Appendix C for existing and proposed bike/ped facilities.

County Highway PF is a designated snowmobile route connecting to State, County and club trails/routes. In 2015, the Village completed a paved multi-use trail on the south side of Highway PF for most of its length.

The main trail facilities include:

- Riverwalk
- U.S. Highway 12 Path
- Great Sauk Trail (Planned)
- CTH PF Multi-Use Trail

2.1.7 Indoor Recreation Facilities

While this is specifically an Outdoor Recreation Plan, it is important to at least acknowledge the opportunities for indoor recreation within the community. The presence of these facilities enhance the recreational opportunities in the community and may serve as the only option for certain recreational activities during the winter months.

Sauk Prairie Ice Arena

The Sauk Prairie Ice Arena is located at 1700 Tower Street and is owned by the Sauk Prairie Youth Hockey Association. The arena is used by the Sauk Prairie High School Hockey team,

youth hockey leagues and adult leagues. The rink may also be reserved in one hour increments for private or team events. The rink is also available to the general public during “Open Skate” periods. Admission is \$5 for non-SPYHA members for a one day pass and \$50 for a season pass.

Community Center

The Community Center at 730 Monroe Street has gym space and classrooms available for classes, rentals and community events. Facilities are available for rent at a sliding scale based on level of school/community affiliation.

Sauk Prairie Healthcare Wellspring Center

The Wellspring Center, located at 90 Oak Street, is the area’s only medical fitness facility. The facility provides a higher level of medical accountability and monitoring than commercial health clubs. As a community-based facility, the Wellspring Center works with all fitness levels, emphasizing lifelong physical fitness and well-being. Staff members include exercise specialists, physical therapists, athletic trainers, personal trainers and exercise instructors all certified or licensed and CPR certified under the direction of a sports medicine physician. While not presently part of the public offerings, the facility also includes an indoor pool for physical therapy.

Indoor Pool

The indoor pool is located at the High School at 105 9th Street and owned by the Sauk Prairie School District. The pool is open to the public for lessons, rentals and open swim.

2.1.8 Private Facilities

Private outdoor recreation facilities should also be noted although they are not maintained or regulated by local municipalities. Despite their omission from analysis in this report, they do expand the range of recreational options in the community.

Shamrock Dog Park

This is a two acre, fenced dog park adjacent to the Sauk Prairie Small Animal Hospital on County Road PF. The park is open to the public for a daily fee of \$2 for the first dog and \$1 for each additional dog. Annual memberships are available to clients of the Sauk Prairie Animal Hospital.

Community Garden

The Community Garden at 990 Broadway Street is adjacent to the Prairie du Sac Cemetery and owned by the Prairie du Sac Cemetery Association.

Bluffview Village Park

This park is in Bluffview Village in the Town of Sumpter approximately 4.5 miles north of Prairie du Sac. It contains a basketball court, playground and open space.

2.2 Inventory of Nearby County and State Facilities

2.2.1 State of Wisconsin Lands

Sauk Prairie Recreation Area

The Sauk Prairie Recreation Area is located on the former grounds of the decommissioned Badger Army Ammunition Plant. The master planning process for the parks use and demolition of the ammunition plant is ongoing. Despite current demolition, the park is open to the public year round. Park activities include hiking, bird watching, hunting, biking and horseback riding with more facilities likely after completion of the master plan. Ownership of the 7,000-plus acres is divided amongst 3 entities: the DNR (3,400 acres), Ho-Chunk Nation (1,600 acres) and the Dairy Forage Research Center (2,100 acres). The recreation area is located approximately two miles north of Prairie du Sac on Highway 12 and will be linked to the Villages of Sauk City and Prairie du Sac via the planned Great Sauk Trail.

Devils Lake State Park

Devils Lake State Park is one of the most popular parks in the state, hosting over 2 million visitors annually. The lake is open to swimming, fishing and boating and the surrounding bluffs contain over 29 miles of hiking and bicycling trails. There are three public camping areas with over 400 individual sites and nine group camp sites. The park's Nature Center hosts numerous events during the year dealing with education focused on wildlife and conservation. The park is approximately 5.5 miles north of Prairie du Sac and adjacent to the Sauk Prairie Recreation Area.

Baraboo Hills Recreation Area

This contiguous hardwood forest is home to over 1,800 plant and animal species. The Baraboo Hills Recreation Area is ecologically unique to the area and contains some of the oldest rock outcrops in North America. The recreation area contains the conservancies Baxter's Hollow (5,696 acres), Hemlock Draw (940 acres), Morgan Hone Preserve (79 acres) and Pine Hollow (337 acres).

Natural Bridge State Park

Natural Bridge State Park gets its name from a sandstone arch naturally created from erosion due to wind and water. Features include hiking trails, hunting areas and a large picnic area. The park is adjacent to the Baraboo Hills Recreation Area approximately nine miles northwest of Prairie du Sac.

Lower Wisconsin State Riverway

The Lower Wisconsin State Riverway is a 79,275 acre corridor surrounding the Wisconsin River beginning in Prairie du Sac and ending at the Mississippi River. The riverway contains State Natural Areas, Wildlife Areas and State Parks and offers a variety of activities including camping, boating, fishing and hiking.

2.2.2 Sauk County Parks

Summer Oaks Boat Landing

The only nearby Sauk County park is the Summer Oaks Boat Landing, located off of Highway 78 near Merrimac. Facilities include the boat landing to Lake Wisconsin and parking. A fee is required for use.

2.2.3 Dane County Parks

Fish Lake Park

This is a three acre park on Fish Lake approximately two miles east of Sauk Prairie. Facilities include a shelter, picnic area and boat launch.

Indian Lake Park

Indian Lake Park is located on Highway 19 in the Town of Berry approximately seven miles southeast of Sauk City. The park's 483 acres contain hiking trails, a pet exercise area and boat launch.

Lussier County Park

This 130 acre park on Fish Lake was the result of a donation from the Lussier family. The park includes approximately 3,000 feet of shoreline and is open for fishing and canoeing. The Dane County Park and Open Space plan recommends a Master Plan be created for the park to guide future development.

Phil's Woods

This 37 acre natural area is located at 6827 North Dunlap Hollow Road in the Town of Roxbury. The park has natural woods and meadow and can be walked but contains no recreational facilities.

Walking Iron Park

This 288 acre park in the Town of Mazomanie is considered a natural resource site. Park amenities include trails, restored prairies and wooded areas.

2.3 Parkland Classification Analysis

The number and type of parks and recreation facilities needed within a community are dependent on the demands of the local residents. Identifying the recreational needs and wants of community residents provides the justification for funding the acquisition and development of new facilities as well as for the maintenance of existing recreational facilities.

2.3.1 Parkland Classification

A parkland classification system is a useful tool to determine if an existing park system serves the needs of a community. The definitions in this document are adapted from the National Recreation and Park Association (NRPA) classification system. Total acreage alone does not guarantee that the community's park needs are being met. A community should have a number of different types of parks to serve the various needs of the residents. They may have "met the standard" in acreage through the creation of one large park, but the community's needs can best be met through a variety of recreational activities. Table 2-1 (next page) explains the seven park classifications most commonly used in the NRPA system, their associated use, service areas, desirable size and desired acres per 1,000 population. A well-rounded park system offers at least one park in each classification.

The term "active recreation" is currently used to define open spaces that contain athletic fields (baseball, soccer, football, etc.), basketball and tennis courts, swimming facilities, and other traditional park sports. If Sauk Prairie is interested in acquiring new active recreation park lands as residential patterns continue to expand, it must balance the need for recreational facilities with the staffing and budget limitations in place. As required by Village ordinance,

land must be dedicated (or fee collected in lieu of) to the Village as part of residential development, and often the proposed lands are situated in low lying, heavily vegetated, non-developable areas and passed off as “Conservancy”. See Chapter 4 for a discussion of parkland dedication ordinance improvements.

2.3.2 Level of Service Standards

Once a community’s existing parks have been classified, a comparison can be made between the national standard for each park type and existing park acreage. While there is no formally established method to determine the Level of Service (LOS) provided by the existing facilities, the following parameters should be considered.

The widely accepted NRPA standard for park acreage per 1,000 population is 10.5 acres. It is recommended that this acreage be distributed among park types as follows:

Mini Parks	0.5 acres/1,000 population
Neighborhood Parks	2 acres/1,000 population
Community Parks	8 acres/1,000 population
Total	10.5 acres/1,000 population

Acreage totals in Sauk Prairie compared to NRPA standards are shown in Chart 2-1. Neighborhood park acreages surpass NRPA standards while mini park, community park and total park acreages do not. An additional 0.74 acres of parkland classified as mini park and 23.84 acres of community park would bring the community up to NRPA standards for all park classifications.

Chart 2-2 uses the 2035 combined population projection (Wisconsin Department of Administration) of 9,560 residents and applies it to measure current acreage figures and future standards. Sauk Prairie would require an additional 2.18 acres of mini park and 41.26 acres of community park to meet the NRPA standard for the 2035 population.

Chart 2-1: Sauk Prairie (Sauk City & Prairie du Sac combined) park acreage compared to recommended national standard







Chart 2-2: Sauk Prairie (Sauk City & Prairie du Sac combined) park acreage compared to 2035 population projection





2.4 Park Service Area Requirements

This method of evaluating a community’s parkland needs and adequacy of service includes plotting park service areas on a base map to identify areas that are underserved. Utilizing the park service radii criteria established by the NRPA, park service areas were mapped for existing mini, neighborhood, and community parks in Sauk Prairie. See Maps 3 and 3.1 in Appendix C.




Maps 3 & 3.1 – Appendix C

The combined park service areas (mini, neighborhood & community parks) provide coverage to Sauk Prairie’s most highly populated areas. There is a lack of coverage to the north side of Prairie du Sac along Water Street and to the southern portion of Sauk City. New parks should be planned if populations grow in these areas, as well as in the future residential growth areas to the west of the two villages.


Analysis of the park service areas by separate park classifications illustrates some gaps in service area by park type. See the following page for maps of the individual service areas. For example, there is only one mini park in Sauk City and there are no community parks in Prairie du Sac. A new community park in the northern portion of the two Villages for example, would fill the void for more complete coverage of this park type. While service area by individual park type is not as vital as the combined park service area coverage, it is important to try to distribute park types evenly to give all citizens a variety of park access.

One important consideration when planning new parks or park facilities is the fact that it is the goal of the Sauk Prairie Recreation Department to provide service to not only the Villages of Sauk City and Prairie du Sac but also the surrounding community. Residents of the Towns of Prairie du Sac, Roxbury and Sumpter are all users of the facilities of the Sauk Prairie Recreation Department for athletic leagues, events and general park use. This extra use might suggest that more park facilities are needed in Sauk Prairie than base analysis may suggest.



2.5 GIS Age Cohort Analysis

This analysis was developed to help prioritize improvements based on the distribution of residents by age and the availability of recreation facilities most suited for these ages in relation to their geographic location. The methodology includes the layering of data on a map (See Maps 7.1 to 7.4 in Appendix C). The result is a graduated scale of relative need or “priority” based on the absence of a particular set of amenities we would expect an age group to utilize. The map is used to identify areas of spatial mismatch where parks containing certain apparatus or amenities are not located in neighborhoods containing user groups best suited for those amenities. For example, if an area contains a high percentage of toddlers (age 2-5) but does not contain toddler-aged play equipment, the priority rating would be “high” because the area lacks the amenities to serve that population.

The analysis was used for four populations:

1. Under 5 years of age: toddlers are best served by play equipment such as sandboxes, toddler swings, tot slides, spring riders, and tilt cups.
2. Ages 5 to 9: this group can be expected to use play equipment such as swings, climbing structures, teeter totters, merry-go-rounds and monkey bars.
3. Ages 10 to 17 years of age: this group can be served by a variety of park facilities. Amenities evaluated for this population include facilities related to baseball, softball, soccer, sand volleyball, skateboarding, ice skating and tennis.
4. Age 55+: service to this group was evaluated using hiking trails, picnic areas, shelters, open space, ADA accessibility, restrooms and parking.

Parks that appear in “priority” areas (shown as the darkest areas on the graduated scale) are further discussed in Chapter 3 and mapped in Appendix C - Map 7 series.

2.6 Bicycle and Pedestrian Connections

A park-by-park analysis revealed a lack of barrier-free access to many park facilities and playgrounds. This is an important consideration for residents who have mobility limitations and require additional accommodation. Barrier-free access to many of the facilities can be accommodated by simple solutions such as installing curb cuts to allow easy access for pedestrians from the street to the park. This missing piece of infrastructure also poses a barrier for cyclists. Additional bike racks should be considered in some parks. Particularly parks adjacent to the future Great Sauk Trail as these parks can be expected to experience an increase in bicycle traffic.

Map 4 (Appendix C) shows the existing and proposed bicycle facilities in Sauk Prairie. Through a combination of planned facilities, this network increases the number of linkages between community destinations and has recreational value for all users. Connections and access to the planned Great Sauk Trail will be a major upgrade to the bicycle network in the area. Linking the community to this route with trails, bike lanes and shared routes should be a priority in the near future. In particular, completing a bike path “loop” connecting the recently constructed Prairie Street path and the future Great Sauk Trail would add great value to the level of bicycle recreation/transportation in the community. Map 4 shows a potential approximate location in the south and west portions of the Villages this future bike path.

Although this plan will seek to identify opportunities to expand this system to reach more park spaces (existing and planned), a comprehensive Bicycle and Pedestrian Plan should be developed. Many new strategies and engineering practices have evolved and are now accepted by Wisconsin DOT and local governments for on-road bicycle facilities such as the use of “Sharrows” (see image on next page). These strategies should be considered as potential tools for improving the bicycling infrastructure.

3 RECOMMENDATIONS

This comprehensive outdoor recreation plan for Sauk Prairie includes a variety of recommendations specifically developed to meet the existing and future needs of the community over the next five years. The plan incorporates local citizen input and has been developed as a result of detailed analysis and participation by local officials, staff, citizens and local organizations as presented in the preceding chapters.

General recommendations are provided for direction on policy and design considerations while also considering operational and maintenance procedures. This chapter also includes a park inventory sheet for each park including general issues, possible improvement options and costs. Where they can be graphically depicted, the park inventory sheets provide schematic concept layouts for park improvement options. This chapter is divided into the following sections:

3.1 General Recommendations: system-wide policies and procedures

3.2 Future Parks and Open Spaces: identification of potential spaces to be acquired and/or developed as public parks and open spaces

3.3 Individual Park Recommendations: an inventory sheet has been provided for each park (includes inventory and park improvement options)

3.1 General Recommendations

Several common issues that surfaced during the planning process are highlighted below. These issues were developed as a result of the community survey, stakeholder surveys, the public information meeting, site visits and meetings with community staff:

- Programming and Facilities for Teens – A common issue brought up in both the online survey and at the public information meeting was a lack of recreational options for teenagers.
- ADA Accessibility – Site visits revealed many parks did not provide ADA approved access to park facilities.
- Connection to the River – This issue first was mentioned in the kick-off meeting and came up throughout the planning process. There is a concern that the community has a certain disconnect from the river and that the riverfront is not being utilized to its full potential.
- A New Community Park/Athletic Facility – The results of parkland classification analysis show that there is a need for a new community park in Sauk Prairie. It is the desire of many in the community that a new park be developed that is capable of serving as a regional athletic complex. Some feel that there are both not enough athletic fields to

match the current demand in the area but also that the fields that are provided do not meet sufficient quality standards.

- New Park Facilities – The most commonly requested new park facilities were a splashpad, multi-use trails, a skatepark and an outdoor ice rink.
- More Restrooms/More Access to Restrooms – Restroom availability, access and maintenance were common issues throughout the planning process. Many in the community felt that the parks that did have restrooms did not make them available for public use often enough. This was particularly an issue in parks that host athletic events (soccer, baseball, etc.) that bring a number of people into the park for an extended period of time.

The following is a list of general recommendations for the Sauk Prairie parks system. Some recommendations should occur when capital improvements and upgrades are considered on an annual basis, while others reflect procedures or policies that should be implemented over time:

- Retrofit all parks and park facilities to be disabled accessible (when possible). This includes assuring barrier-free access to all play areas, shelters, river access points, seating areas, and restrooms.
- Improve existing playgrounds for all ages.
- Establish more facilities and programs for the 13-18 age group.
- Focus specifically on improving the accessibility and visibility of riverfront parks in an effort to help reestablish a connection between the community and the river.
- Continue to study the land availability and feasibility for a new community park location.
- Plan for the installation of new park facilities.
- Revisit park restroom policy in terms of accessibility and consider the construction of additional park restrooms where needed.
- Continue developing the community wide bicycle and pedestrian system and in particular plan for its connection to the future Great Sauk Trail. Coordinate with local, county, and state agencies as appropriate to provide for safe crossings of major streets and highways.
- Continue to pursue funds for park and recreation programs and park development.

3.1.1 Facilities

- a. Where possible with existing infrastructure, assure that all parks are improved with water fountains. These facilities should meet current ADA compliant design parameters.
- b. Cover surfaces directly under play equipment and a safe zone around the play equipment with a 10-inch to 12-inch layer of resilient safety surface. Commonly used resilient surfaces are sand, pea gravel, recycled rubber or wood chips. To meet the Federal ADA requirements, Sauk Prairie should consider using engineered wood fiber or a similar product that provides wheelchair accessibility as well as a resilient surface.
- c. Conduct a safety audit/inspection of all existing play areas for current National Playground Safety Institute (NPSI) conformance. Audits should be performed by a Certified Playground Safety Inspector (CPSI). This includes a thorough examination of existing slides, merry-go-rounds, and other play structures.

- d. Improve existing playgrounds as neighborhood gathering places for all ages. This includes the addition of passive spaces, shelters, and benches for older residents.
- e. Where flagpoles exist they should be properly lighted. Proper pruning of shrubs or other flora that may exist at the flagpole is necessary to keep lights functional.
- f. Acquire and develop additional parklands as land patterns develop. Incorporate new neighborhood-focused facilities consistent with the patterns of new residential growth. This should be coordinated with the Comprehensive Plan and pertinent ordinances.
- g. Complete a concept plan or Master Plan (neighborhood and community parks) process for each new park development site to accommodate the needs of the community and neighborhood they serve. Refer to Map 8 for potential new park locations.
- h. Perform systematic routine maintenance of park facilities and equipment including:
 - i. Play equipment
 - ii. Play fields
 - iii. Benches and picnic tables
 - iv. Trail systems
 - v. Restrooms and shelters

3.1.2 Promotion/Education

- a. Improve and standardize on-site park signage incorporating the Sauk Prairie Riverway logo. Expand the community-wide wayfinding system to identify key parks and bicycle routes along primary transportation corridors. Regularly update all bicycle and park system maps as new facilities are developed.
- b. Utilize marquee signs and other displays to announce special events, prices or programs. For example, major parks that hold sporting tournaments (Jaycee Athletic Park) could benefit from variable message signs. This plan recommends coordinating with user groups and/or advertisers to offset costs and install marquees when budgets, grants, or fundraising allow for purchase and installation.
- c. Continue to communicate with user groups over facilities updates and promote donations and formalized use agreements for maintenance.
- d. Enhance the Sauk Prairie Chamber of Commerce and Sauk Prairie Recreation Department web pages to include a parks location map, trail map and specific site maps for each park illustrating site layout and amenities.

3.1.3 Environmentally Sustainable Practices

- a. Trash receptacles should be evenly distributed throughout Sauk Prairie's parks. The method of collection should be used to determine receptacle locations. Placement of trash receptacles near sitting benches, for example, is not preferred since it may discourage use of the benches or the trash receptacle.

- b. Consider adopting a “grow not mow” policy in parks to limit how often (and what portions of) parks are mowed. Adding a day or more to the mowing cycle and preserving natural grasslands and other features in parks can reduce the amount of fossil fuels consumed in park maintenance operations, increase natural buffers around shoreland and wooded areas, and reduce soil erosion.
- c. When replacing and/or installing new lighting in parks, consider fixtures that utilize solar regeneration and LED illumination to reduce long-term maintenance costs and minimize non-renewable energy use.

3.1.4 Surplus or Shortage Property Strategies

- a. At 35 acres, current Community Park acreage totals in Sauk Prairie do not meet the NRPA standard of 59 acres. Ongoing discussions have centered around the development a future community park/athletic facility which would offset the current shortfall in terms of acreage and amenities. Several potential sites have been considered for this park but funding and land availability issues will need to be resolved before this project can proceed. Land acquisition and development for an athletic complex could approach \$4 million to \$6 million.
- b. Map 8 indicates opportunities for future mini, neighborhood and community parks. These potential park locations in Sauk City, Prairie du Sac and the Town of Prairie du Sac are labeled as “M”, “N” and “C” on the map. These placeholder icons show a general area for future parks and are intended to fulfill service area gaps in areas of likely population expansion.

3.1.5 Finance

- a. The Intergovernmental Planning Committee and the two Villages should pursue grant funding to supplement capital funds for future development and park system upgrades. Some facilities mentioned in this plan are almost entirely dependent on grant acquisition and other non-local government funding sources as development costs are too great through the general fund alone.
- b. User fees should be reevaluated commensurate with increases in service.
- c. Consider private sponsorships and non-traditional funding opportunities to fund facilities improvements or special events. These include cash and property donations or planned giving. Sauk Prairie area organizations and businesses focused on health, wellness, recreation and food would be logical partners.
- d. Continue to require parkland dedication as a condition of land development approval. See Section 4.2.1 for details of Sauk City and Prairie du Sac parkland dedication ordinances.

3.2 Future Parks and Open Spaces

There are four general locations that have been chosen as potential future park locations. These sites were chosen based on the potential for their service area to satisfy the recreational needs of those living in areas of likely future development. These locations can be seen on Map 8.

3.2.1 Future Park Locations

Neighborhood Park 1

This area was chosen as a potential location for a new neighborhood park to satisfy the likely expansion of population into this area. The 2013 amendment to the Sauk Prairie Comprehensive Plan identifies this area as a proposed development area and therefore an area where additional park land will be needed.

Neighborhood Park 2

This is the site of the recently closed Spruce Street Elementary School. This site could potentially be converted to a park or other recreational use site. If parts of the site are sold for future residential development, a portion should be retained as parkland, serving both the youth and older population nearby.

Community Park 1 / Mini Park

This is a potential site for a new community park that would both expand the service area of community parks to a greater percentage of the current community but also serve areas of future population expansion. A mini park could be desirable in this location if the community park does not come to fruition.

Community/Neighborhood Park

This could be a potential site for either a community or neighborhood park depending on future development. Like Neighborhood Park 1, this site was chosen based on the Comprehensive Plan identifying this as an area of future development. If Community Park 1 is developed in that location this park would most likely be a neighborhood park.



3.2.2 Park Layout Concept /Park Master Plans

If significant improvements are planned for a specific park, a concept or master plan should be completed before construction begins. The goal of the plan is to determine what type of improvements are possible in the given space and to provide a guide for the development of those improvements.

The process for development of a park master plan includes research and data collection to identify drainage patterns, topography and other site features. After this initial reconnaissance, a public meeting is held to gather input on preferred park programming and amenities. Following this community engagement, concept development plans are created and

cost estimates are prepared. These concept plans are further refined through public feedback and staff discussions into a final graphic and summary report.

3.3 Individual Park Recommendations

The following section discusses more detailed recommendations for each park. These recommended improvements are based on issues identified in site visits and comments from residents, stakeholders and local officials. Improvement options identified for each park are included in the 5-Year Capital Improvements Table in Chapter 4.

Each park's inventory sheets contain the location of the park, existing facilities, observed issues, and recommendations for improvements. Not all improvements can be made in the next 5-years, and many require substantial investment in the form of time, money, or human capital to implement. Improvement recommendations should be viewed as options that could occur to mitigate, improve, or promote aspects of the park site.

A sample inventory sheet (Figure 3.3) illustrates how information is presented on each park sheet. Park sheets are presented by parkland classifications devised by the National Recreation and Park Association as identified in Chapter 2.



4 IMPLEMENTATION

The previous chapter of this report detailed an extensive number of specific improvement options. This chapter of the comprehensive outdoor recreation plan provides the mechanism for implementing them. It includes a compilation of capital improvements, park acquisition and development mechanisms, and funding sources. The chapter also includes the process for adopting, monitoring, and updating this plan.

4.1 Plan Approval and Amendments

Introduction

A prerequisite to participation in outdoor recreation grant programs is the adoption and subsequent Department of Natural Resources acceptance of a local comprehensive outdoor recreation plan.

Comprehensive planning is an overall survey of the existing facilities within a given jurisdiction, and gives recommendations for future improvements. A comprehensive outdoor recreation plan (CORP) is only the first step in the development of a recreational park site or system.

Master planning, which follows the recommendations of the comprehensive plan, is an overall view and analysis of an existing or proposed park area. The purpose is to guide the orderly development of a park or recreational facility.

Site planning, is the detailed plan of how an area within a park or recreation area will be developed. Site plans supply the construction details needed to develop a facility recommended in the master plan.

This plan provides strategies and recommendations for improving public parks in Sauk Prairie. It is anticipated that master planning for community parks and proposed parks is a high priority and should be featured prominently when budgets are determined over the life of this plan.

Formal Plan Approval

This CORP should be approved by the local governing bodies after thorough review by the Recreation Commission. The CORP could be adopted by the local communities as a detailed element of the Sauk Prairie Comprehensive Plan, as a stand-alone planning document or it could first be adopted as a stand-alone document in 2015 and then also as part of the Sauk Prairie Comprehensive Plan when that update process is complete in 2016. Any of these approaches will satisfy the requirements for grant eligibility.

Amending the Plan

Plan amendments are common and should be considered part of the planning process. They frequently represent good implementation or plan usage and should be acceptable for consideration by local decision-makers. Amendments must follow the same process as the original plan and should be developed in coordination with the Recreation Commission before they are presented to the Village Boards for approval. Amendments generally prolong the effectiveness of the parent plan.

The Sauk Prairie Comprehensive Outdoor Recreation Plan will make the communities of Sauk City and Prairie du Sac eligible for funding through the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources through the year 2020. Similarly, since this plan has been developed with a five-year timeframe, it should be amended in 2020 to ensure grant eligibility and to reflect progress made over time.

4.2 Park and Recreation System Management

4.2.1 Management History and Strategy

The Sauk Prairie communities have a long and strong history of providing joint and collaborative governmental service, and even shared departments. In 2004, five Sauk Prairie area municipalities worked with the School District to form the Sauk Prairie Recreation Commission and hire a Recreation Director to coordinate recreational programming in the Sauk Prairie area. The effort was initiated by intergovernmental agreement under a section of Wisconsin Statutes that authorizes joint park and recreational departments. Under this 2004 agreement, the Commission is charged with managing the Sauk Prairie Recreational Department, which is generally charged with facilitating recreational programming for residents in participating municipalities. The Commission and Department may hold equipment and property, but only up to \$50,000 in value and not including any real estate.

By a separate 2015 agreement between the School District and Sauk Prairie Recreation Commission, the Recreation Director now also serves as the Education Director for the Sauk Prairie School District Community Center. The Commission and District now share funding responsibility for the new Community Education and Recreation Director position, with the School District funding Community Center staff under the Director and the Commission (through participating municipalities) funding the Recreation Department staff under the Director. Other Recreation Department staff include a Recreation Supervisor and seasonal part-timers. The School District provides space, fiscal management, and equipment and further administrative support.

The Recreation Department handles registration for most of the youth sports organizations in Sauk Prairie. Through this type of collaboration and on its own, the Department supports a wide range of recreational activities for youth and adults the Sauk Prairie community, including volleyball, basketball, gymnastics, soccer, baseball, softball, lacrosse, football, and wrestling. The Community Education and Recreation Director now also oversees community educational programming, which includes some programming with a recreational aspect as well (e.g., yoga classes).

Each participating municipality—mainly the Village of Sauk City and Village of Prairie du Sac—owns, maintains, and upgrades park and recreational lands and facilities in their

respective jurisdictions. Further, each school site in the Sauk Prairie Area School District contains both indoor and outdoor recreational facilities and spaces, which are owned and maintained by the District. There are some challenges to recreational use, management, and growth as a result. These municipally- and District-owned lands and facilities are sometimes managed to different standards and at different times than ideal for use by participants in the programs managed and coordinated by the Recreation Department. Further, there may be some minor equipment and personnel redundancies, and buying power deficiencies, resulting from each municipality (and the School District) maintaining its own recreation lands. Priority for using District facilities is provided to school-sanctioned events. Finally, the ability for any municipality in the area to take on a major park and recreation project on its own, such as a community park/athletic complex, is limited by each small community owning and managing its own parklands.

To address some of these challenges and capture new opportunities, the Sauk Prairie municipalities and School District could explore expanding the responsibilities and authority of the current Sauk Prairie Recreation Department into a joint “Sauk Prairie Parks and Recreation Department.” There are successful examples in southern Wisconsin (see discussion in call-out box below).

Joint Park and Recreation Departments in Wisconsin

Section 66.0123(3)(b) of Wisconsin Statutes authorizes two or more governmental units desire to share a “department of public recreation” by intergovernmental agreement. Such department is to be overseen by a board of three or more members appointed by the heads of the participating governmental units acting jointly. Appointment terms are unpaid and last for three years, but with initial appointments staggered to provide an overlap of terms. Activities the board may undertake include the expenditure of funds, employment of a supervisor of recreation, employment of assistants, and purchasing of equipment and supplies, in addition to general supervision of the administration, maintenance and operation of the department and its recreational activities.

The City and Village of Pewaukee adopted ordinances approving consolidation of recreation services in November 1996. Consolidation allowed the communities' two Park and Recreation Director positions to merge into a single position two years later. The seven member Joint Park and Recreation Board is responsible for assisting the director with the annual budget, reviewing department policies, and hiring of full-time staff. Currently, full-time positions are a director, recreation supervisor, park maintenance supervisor, and park foreman. Around 13 part-time maintenance staff and 60 seasonal part-time recreation staff are also employed by this joint Pewaukee Park and Recreation Department. The elimination of duplicated services allows both communities the benefit of expanded programming and better maintenance, in addition to expanding park lands.

The Dells/Delton Parks and Recreation Department operates within four counties in central Wisconsin. The Village of Lake Delton, located just south of the City of Wisconsin Dells, utilizes the City's recreation amenities under a 2012 agreement. Wisconsin Dells operates both communities' parks and recreational facilities, including setting up programs, activities, eligibility criteria, costs/fees, and staffing. The Village supplies one of the seven members to the City's Parks, Recreation, and Waterways Commission. The agreement operates on a year-to-year basis until either the Village or City decides to opt out. The City employs a Parks, Recreation & Waterway Director, and a Recreation Coordinator to manage the shared program.

The expanded Sauk Prairie Parks and Recreation Department could still be managed by the Recreation Commission. At a minimum, it would be a joint department of at least the two Villages, but ideally would also continue to include the Towns of Prairie du Sac, Roxbury, and Sumpter. The School District would remain a key player.

Assuming modification of the 2004 agreement, an expanded Sauk Prairie Parks and Recreation Department may serve the following greater roles and benefits:

- Manage and maintain municipal park lands and facilities, potentially using fewer resources than today, and to a common standard to facilitate their programming and recreational use. School District lands should once again be included in this discussion.
- Enable the pooling of resources and authority to facilitate larger park and recreational acquisition and construction projects, potentially including the community park/athletic complex discussed elsewhere in this CORP. This may require modification on the Commission's/Department's current limits to owning equipment and property.
- Be charged with the responsibility of implementing this CORP, and assuring that park investments across municipalities complement one another rather than duplicate or compete with one another. This implementation role could include fundraising, including corporate and community contacts and grant identification and writing.
- Play a greater role in the coordination and management of youth sports programs in the area, beyond the current registration function. While volunteer management of youth sports leagues in the area has been tremendous, it can be a strain and difficult to sustain. This expanded function may evolve over time based on interest from the different youth sports leagues.
- Serve as a unified voice for participating in State and County park and recreation initiatives (including grant opportunities) that affect the Sauk Prairie area, relieving the pressure and redundancy of staffs from the individual communities to do the same.

There are issues to resolve before a joint Sauk Prairie Park and Recreation Department could become reality. These include legal review, the continued role of the School District and its lands and facilities, how to evolve the current Recreation Commission and Department, which municipalities would share the expanded joint Department, which other communities may be solicited as contributors, funding share allocation, and transitional issues.

4.3 Park Acquisition and Development Mechanisms

4.3.1 Parkland Dedication Ordinance

Many communities have developer exactions for parkland acquisition. These exactions are designed to help a growing community acquire new park land to keep pace with new residential development. As residents move into a new subdivision, they place additional stress on existing park facilities. Developer exactions, agreed upon during the subdivision review and

approval period, provide land, cash, or a combination of both to be used for the provision of park facilities that serve the new neighborhood.

The Village of Prairie du Sac Subdivision and Land Division Regulations (Chapter 3, Title 10) covers dedication of park lands in a new subdivision. The need and location of park and recreation sites is to be determined by the appropriate Village approval authority, following a recommendation from the Village Board's Parks Committee. Where such authority determines that park and recreation site dedication is not compatible with the Comprehensive Plan or official map, or for other reasons is not advised by the Village, the subdivider shall, in lieu thereof, pay a fee to the Village to meet this requirement in whole or on a pro-rata basis. The normal amount of park and recreation site dedication shall be 1,300 square feet for each single family unit, 1,100 square feet for each duplex unit, and 1,000 square feet for each multifamily unit.

The Village of Sauk City also covers parkland dedication in its Village ordinance (Chapter 350, Article 1). The ordinance states that 8% of any new subdivision should be dedicated to parks, recreational areas or other public uses. If the dedication would result in lands that are not useful to the Village, the Plan Commission may stipulate to the owner some other equitable means for making a dedication or cash payment to the Village in lieu thereof.

Usable Lands

Because the intent of parkland dedication requirements is to provide sufficient recreation lands for new residents, mini or neighborhood parks should be developed within new developments. Neighborhood parks are designed to provide active and passive recreation activities and organized league recreation, as well as informal "pick up" play. The ½ mile radius service area should include the entire neighborhood; with some neighborhood overlap if features are unique. The average neighborhood park commonly ranges from 3 to 10 acres in size and serves from 1,000 to 5,000 people – basically one park for every elementary school. Defining the term "usable lands" is very important to ensuring the quality of the proposed dedication. To obtain credit towards meeting parkland dedication requirements, Sauk Prairie will utilize the following criteria in evaluating land proposed for dedication:

- Located outside of the floodplain, wetlands, surface waters, storm water basins and conveyance routes, and other areas with severe limitations for park development.
- Contains developer-finished slopes of less than 4% for active recreation areas, and slopes less than 12% for passive recreation areas and conservancy.
- Contains soils that are suitable for construction of the anticipated park facilities, such as athletic fields, parking lots, and shelters.
- At least 15% of the perimeter of the proposed parkland will be adjacent to a public street.
- Visible and accessible to the public (foot, bike, and auto access) and for effective monitoring for public safety.
- Sufficiently shaped to accommodate the anticipated facilities.
- Not presenting any sort of environmental hazard to the community, such as through soil contamination or excessive nuisance or invasive vegetation.
- Situated in a location that is consistent with this plan, that contributes to community development goals, and that adequately serves the park's service area.

4.3.2 User Groups

Sauk Prairie should coordinate with potential user groups when planning new facilities to see if cost-sharing, donation, or outright purchase options exist.

4.3.3 Planned Giving

In many communities, parkland development often occurs with the availability of land. Donations of private land for a public purpose is not uncommon, but there needs to be criteria for accepting lands, and a formal procedure for how the land will be planned and used in the best interest of the community. A planned giving program through the Villages would allow prospective patrons to dedicate land in a legal manner that provides a legacy for how the land will be utilized over time.

4.3.4 Grant Funding

Implementation dollars are available for acquisition and development of recreation spaces and facilities. Linear parks and trails can be funded through the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (WDNR) or the Department of Transportation (WDOT). The WDNR also provides monies for the acquisition of lands, the stabilization of shorelands, and the protection of environmentally sensitive areas. A complete list of grant opportunities is provided in Section 4.4.

4.4 Grant Information for Park Acquisition and Development

The state and federal government provides grants to local governments for the acquisition and development of parks. Many of these programs require that a local government submit an approved park and open space plan or master plan to the WDNR as a condition for eligibility. By adopting this Comprehensive Outdoor Recreation Plan, by ordinance, the Villages of Sauk City and Prairie du Sac have met the eligibility requirement for these grant programs until 2020.

4.4.1 Projects that Require Grant Funding

The financial realities of our time necessitate the acquisition of outside funding to enable the development of large projects. Grant funding also provides seed money and crucial capital for leveraging additional community dollars and support. While many projects identified in this CORP would benefit from the acquisition of outside funding sources, some projects will require grant funding if they are to be realized. Grant programs are discussed in the next section (4.4.2).

4.4.2 Grant Programs

This section provides general information and details for many of the grant programs that may be used to acquire and develop local park facilities, linear trails, or beaches. Categories, by authorization agency, include:

- Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources
- Wisconsin Department of Transportation
- Wisconsin Department of Administration
- Other Programs (Various Agencies)

Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR)

Knowles-Nelson Stewardship Program: Named for two of Wisconsin's most revered conservation leaders, Governor Warren Knowles and Senator Gaylord Nelson, the Wisconsin Legislature created this innovative program in 1989 to preserve valuable natural areas and wildlife habitat, protect water quality and fisheries, and expand opportunities for outdoor recreation.

All grant program awards cover up to 50% of eligible project costs. Projects eligible for Stewardship grant programs require that all land acquisition and development projects provide public access for “nature-based outdoor recreation” purposes. DNR decisions as to whether a particular project activity is “nature-based outdoor recreation” are made on a case-by-case basis. Please note that purchase and installation of playground equipment, and the purchase of land for recreation areas not related to nature-based outdoor recreation (dedicated sports fields, swimming pools, etc.) are not eligible. The Stewardship Program includes the four funds described below (A – D). For more information and to submit applications contact the South Central Region representative (listed below). A. Acquisition and Development of Local Parks (ADLP)

Description: Stewardship sets aside 50% of funds for projects that improve community parks and acquire land for public outdoor recreation. Applicants compete against other applicants from their region. Funds may be used for both land acquisition projects and development projects for nature-based outdoor recreation, such as fishing piers, hiking trails and picnic facilities. Funds are not available for non-nature based activities such as baseball and soccer fields. Costs associated with operation and maintenance of parks and other outdoor recreation facilities are not eligible for Stewardship funds.

Eligible Project Examples:

1. Land acquisition projects that will provide opportunities for nature-based outdoor recreation.
2. Property with frontage on rivers, streams, lakes, estuaries and reservoirs that will provide water-based outdoor recreation.
3. Property that provides special recreation opportunities, such as floodplains, wetlands and areas adjacent to scenic highways.
4. Natural areas and outstanding scenic areas where the objective is to preserve the scenic or natural values, including areas of physical or biological importance and wildlife areas. These areas shall be open to the general public for outdoor recreation use to the extent that the natural attributes of the areas will not be seriously impaired or lost.
5. Land within urban areas for day-use picnic areas.
6. Land for nature-based outdoor recreation trails.

Ineligible Project Examples:

1. Projects that are not supported by a local comprehensive outdoor recreational plan.

2. Land to be used for non-nature based outdoor recreation such as athletic facilities.
3. Acquisition and development of golf courses.

B. Urban Rivers (UR)

Description: Stewardship allocates 20% of funds annually to restore or preserve the character of urban riverways through the acquisition of land or easements adjacent to rivers. Funding will be provided for projects that are part of a plan to enhance the quality of a river corridor. Applicants compete against other applicants statewide. The purposes of the program are:

1. To provide for economic revitalization through the restoration or preservation of urban rivers or riverfronts;
2. To improve outdoor recreational opportunities by increasing access to urban rivers for a variety of public uses, including but not limited to, fishing, wildlife observation, enjoyment of scenic beauty, canoeing, boating, hiking and bicycling;
3. To preserve or restore significant historical, cultural, or natural areas along urban rivers.

Funding Priorities: Priority is given to projects that have one or more of the following characteristics:

1. Acquires land or land rights that preserve or restore natural values, including aesthetic values, and enhance environmental quality along urban waterways.
2. Provides new or expanded diverse recreational opportunities to all segments of urban populations.
3. Provides new or expanded access to urban waterways.
4. Acquires blighted lands that will be restored to complement riverfront redevelopment activities.
5. Encourages comprehensive riverway planning within and between municipalities and other agencies.
6. Provides opportunities for increasing tourism.
7. Acquires lands that through proper management will improve or protect water quality.

C. Urban Green Space (UGS)

Description: The intent of the Urban Green Space Program (UGS) is to provide open natural space within or in proximity to urban areas; to protect from urban development areas that have scenic, ecological or other natural value and are within or in proximity to urban areas; and to provide land for noncommercial gardening for the residents of an urbanized area.

Funding Priorities: Priority is given to projects that have one or more of the following characteristics:

- a. Planning Considerations, including:
 - Specifically implementing a priority of the Statewide Comprehensive Outdoor Recreation Plan
 - Implementing the approved master plans of 2 or more units of government or regional planning agencies
 - Preserving land that is listed on the natural heritage inventory database
 - Implementing elements of water quality plans or initiatives
- b. Project Considerations, including:
 - Serving the greatest population centers
 - Serving areas of rapidly increasing populations

- Providing accessibility
 - Having unique natural features, threatened or endangered species, or significant ecological value
 - Providing open natural linear corridors connecting open natural areas
 - Having water frontage
 - Containing or restoring wetlands
 - Protecting sensitive wildlife habitat
 - Protecting an area threatened by development
 - Preserving a natural community or one that could be restored
 - Having regional or statewide significance
 - Relating to brownfield redevelopment
- c. Administrative considerations, including:
- Projects that are ready to be implemented and/or continue previously started projects

D. Acquisition of Development Rights

Description: The purpose of the Acquisition of Development Rights Program is to protect natural, agricultural, or forest lands that enhance nature-based outdoor recreation.

"Development Rights" are the rights of a landowner to develop their property to the greatest extent allowed under state and local laws. The goals of the program are achieved through the purchase of those development rights and compensating landowners for limited future development on their land.

Funding Priorities: Priority is given to projects that have one or more of the following characteristics:

- Property with frontage on rivers, streams, lakes or estuaries
- Property that creates a buffer between land that has been permanently protected for natural resource and conservation purposes and potential or existing residential, commercial or industrial development
- Property that is within the boundaries of an acquisition project established by the DNR, a government unit or a NCO where the uses of the property will complement the goals of the project and the stewardship program
- Property that is within an environmental corridor that connects 2 or more established resource protection areas

Federal Programs Related to the Stewardship Program: The Land and Water Conservation Fund (LWCF) and Recreational Trails Act (RTA) programs fund projects that are similar to the Stewardship programs. One primary difference is that LWCF and RTA programs are not restricted to nature-based outdoor recreation projects. In these programs, nature-based outdoor recreation projects compete against projects with non-nature based recreation elements for LWCF funds. Another difference is that federal programs have additional requirements that must be satisfied – for example, compliance with the National Environmental Policy Act, the Historic Preservation Act, etc. Federal programs administered through the DNR include the two funds described below (E, F).

E. Land and Water Conservation Fund (LWCF)

Description: This program was established to encourage nationwide creation and interpretation of high quality outdoor recreational opportunities. The program funds both state and local outdoor recreation activities.

Funding Priorities: Priority is given to projects that have one or more of the following characteristics:

- Relationship to the Statewide Comprehensive Outdoor Recreation Plan; activities must be in locally approved plans
- Regional or statewide in nature
- Acquires land where a plan supports need
- Provides or enhances water-based activity
- Serves the greatest populations
- Involves other local government's, cooperation, volunteers, local donations
- First time applicants
- Sponsor has completed past projects
- Provides multi-season, multi activity use
- Basic over elaborate facilities
- Participant over spectator facilities
- "Nature based" restriction does not apply

Eligible Project Examples:

- Land acquisition
- Development of outdoor recreation facilities, including active sports facilities

F. Recreational Trails Act (RTA)

Description: These funds are used to develop and maintain recreational trails and trail-related facilities for both motorized and non-motorized recreational trail uses. RTA funds may only be used on trails which have been identified in or which further a specific goal of a local, county, or state trail plan included or referenced in a statewide comprehensive outdoor recreation plan. 30% of funds must be used on motorized trail uses, 30% on non-motorized trail uses, and 40% on diversified (multiple) trail uses.

Funding Priorities: Priority is given to projects that have one or more of the following characteristics:

- Maintenance and restoration of existing trails.
- Development and rehabilitation of trailside and trailhead facilities and trail linkages.
- Construction of new trails (with certain restrictions on Federal lands).
- Acquisition of easement or property for trails.

Wisconsin Department of Transportation (WisDOT)

The Wisconsin Department of Transportation offers a variety of programs that can provide financial assistance to local governments, along with other public and private entities, to make improvements to highways, airports, harbors, bike, rail and pedestrian facilities. The use of these funds would be most closely tied to developing trails to link parks and conservancy areas to places of employment, residence, and commerce.

G. Surface Transportation Program – Rural (STP-R)

Description: This program allocates federal funds to complete a variety of improvements to federal-aid-eligible roads and streets outside of census-designated urban areas. Projects must meet federal and state requirements. Communities are eligible for funding on roads functionally classified collector or arterial. The WisDOT requires that pedestrian and on-street

bicycle accommodations be part of all STP projects within or in the vicinity of population centers, unless extraordinary circumstances can be demonstrated to WisDOT for not providing these accommodations.

H. Transportation Alternatives Program (TAP)

Description: The Transportation Alternatives Program (TAP) allocates federal funds to transportation improvement projects that “expand travel choice, strengthen the local economy, improve the quality of life, and protect the environment.” TAP is a new legislative program that was authorized in 2012 by federal transportation legislation, the Moving Ahead for Progress in the 21st Century Act (MAP-21). The transportation alternatives program provides for the implementation of a variety of non-traditional projects, with examples ranging from the restoration of historic transportation facilities, to bike and pedestrian facilities, to landscaping and scenic beautification, and to the mitigation of water pollution from highway runoff. Examples of bicycle and pedestrian projects that TAP will likely fund include: multi-use trails, paved shoulders, bike lanes, bicycle route signage, bicycle parking, overpasses/underpasses/bridges, sidewalks, and pedestrian crossings. Local municipalities contribute 20% of the project costs. Federal regulations restrict the use of funds on trails that allow motorized users, except snowmobiles.

Wisconsin Department of Administration

I. Community Development Block Grant – Public Facilities (CDBG-PF)

Description: Available through the Wisconsin Department of Administration (DOA), communities receiving CDBG funds from the State may use the funds for many kinds of community development activities including, but not limited to:

- Acquisition of property for public purposes;
- Construction or reconstruction of streets, water and sewer facilities, neighborhood centers, recreation facilities, and other public works;
- Demolition;
- Rehabilitation of public and private buildings;
- Public services;
- Planning activities;
- Assistance to nonprofit entities for community development activities; and
- Assistance to private, for profit entities to carry out economic development activities (including assistance to micro-enterprises).

4.5 Capital Improvements Plan

Capital improvements to a park are the addition of labor and materials that improve the overall value and usefulness of that park. Capital improvements are designated and funded individually through segregated municipal funds. Routine maintenance, on the other hand, is considered to be the repair and upkeep of existing park facilities, such as painting a shelter building. Routine maintenance of park facilities does not appreciably increase the value or usefulness of the park, and is traditionally funded through the park department's operations budget. Non-routine maintenance of park facilities, such as upgrading a toilet facility to be barrier-free, is usually considered to be a capital improvement.

Most projects can be easily identified and categorized, but some are difficult. When a project falls on the borderline between a capital improvement and maintenance, the overall cost becomes the determinant. Projects with a high cost, such as that for seal coating roads or parking lots, are categorized as capital improvements.

The capital improvements program for each park is a combination of several types of projects. These projects are ranked according to their importance and priority in the overall development of the park, and the value of the project to the overall village parks system. Capital improvements for this plan are ranked in the following manner:

- a. Improvements to existing facilities that will:
 - i. Correct health and safety hazards
 - ii. Upgrade deficient facilities
 - iii. Modernize adequate but outdated facilities
- b. Installation of facilities as deemed appropriate and necessary through public demand (public meetings, park committee input, village budgeting)
- c. Development of new facilities as deemed necessary through level of service, population projection, and age cohort analyses

Generally, improvements to existing facilities rank the highest in the capital improvements program, while new facilities are usually ranked lower, according to their relative need in each park location. Improvements that correct health and safety hazards are always the highest ranking priority. Improvements that are deemed necessary through empirical analyses are usually ranked the lowest.

Parks have been divided by classifications established by the National Recreation and Park Association (NRPA) including Mini, Neighborhood, Community, Conservancy, and Special Use parks. Improvement costs are shown by year (2016-2020) which establishes a priority ranking – higher priority improvements would occur sooner in the schedule. When a long-term improvement is forecast to occur beyond 2020 the improvement is highlighted and labeled “LONGTERM”. In some cases a capital improvement may utilize a special fund. When this occurs the improvement contains an identifier citing that particular funding source. Depending on the fund, it may or may not be reflected in the subtotal for each park type.

The total improvement cost by park classification and by year is assembled in Table 4. Costs associated with each park improvement option are based upon recent regional project construction costs and may be spread out over many years. An inflation factor of 2.5% starting in year three has been used to adjust for cost increases. This inflation factor, like the priority rankings, should be adjusted over time to reflect changes that may occur which were unknown when this plan was originally prepared.

Q13 Question 13 of 16 - Would you be willing to pay more in taxes or user fees for that facility/service?






Overlay of D & B - Priority areas for installation of playground equipment for children under 5











Overlay of D & B - Priority areas for installation of playground equipment for children ages 10 to 17




Overlay of D & B - Priority areas for installation of park facilities for ages 55 and above
